

I felt like she really cared about me and wanted to make the process as easy as possible. I really appreciated that. I'm so grateful for her and the *NeighborWorks program.*

What specific areas are you now more confident about? I'm definitely more confident about the home loan approval process. I also know a lot more about what to look for in a house. I'm so glad I bought the house I did and, thanks to help and guidance from Neighbor Works and my bank, Denali Alaskan, I avoided buying a house that needed a lot of repairs. That has been such a relief. You have no idea how much time and money goes into each house project until you have owned a home and tried to do your own repairs.

What would you tell people about us? What will people get from working with our team? I have already recommended the NeighborWorks program to several of my friends who are interested in buying their first home. I tell them about how nice NeighborWorks is to work with and that they can save you so much money by avoiding the PMI payments.

The first time I visited Alaska was the **L** summer of 1980. I was in the midst of graduate school at the University of Colorado when a friend invited me to drive the Alaska Highway with him and his dog in his white Chevy construction van. It didn't take me long to fall in love with Alaska and the beautiful wilderness, the long days, fun-filled adventures and great opportunities. The job market was burgeoning, especially for a person pursuing a master's degree in Public Administration. I headed back to Colorado, finished my degree, and returned to Alaska for good in 1982.

I didn't find a good administrative job right away, so I fell back to my carpentry trade that had sustained me for many years, working on the Sullivan Arena and other jobs. In 1983 I was hired into an ideal position for a newly formed non profit - Anchorage Neighborhood Housing Services. As a Housing Rehabilitation Specialist the job was a nice blend of my education and construction background. ANHS was just a year old and working to revitalize the Spenard neighborhood. While I was not around Faye Connolly's kitchen table when the organization was formed, I did work closely with Faye and the other founders including Bill Gee, Jim Cash, Mary McKinnon, Jim Kubitz, and the first Executive Director Cynthia Parker. I stayed with ANHS until 1986.

Now, more than 30 years later, I'm now the new Executive Director of NeighborWorks Alaska, formerly ANHS. The organization has grown from eight employees to over 60, and our annual budget exceeds \$14 million. While the organization has expanded, it has not wavered from its mission of improving the quality of life for families and individuals by preserving homes, creating new housing opportunities and strengthening neighborhoods. Our Affordable Housing department now provides nearly 1,000 well maintained and managed rental units across

Anchorage; our HomeOwnership Center provides counseling and lending to many first time home buyers; and our Community Development department manages housing programs for folks who have struggled with traditional avenues, and still continues our tradition of revitalizing neighborhoods. We have a committed Board and dedicated, professional staff.

I am devoting myself to continuing the strong history of this organization and to meeting the emerging needs for housing and community development in Alaska. I am proud of my association with NeighborWorks and am thrilled to be back! Mu Pondage

VISTA works to seed change

This November, we bid farewell to our year-long **L** AmeriCorps VISTA (Volunteer in Service to America),

Armani Thomas. Armani came to Alaska from Chicago, bringing new ideas and a passion for improving food security among disadvantaged communities. Over the past year he worked on several local garden projects, started a Community Seed Library in partnership with the Mountain View Library, and worked to build equity in both practice and conversation among local programs. Before he returned to Chicago, Armani shared some insights from his experience here in Alaska:

"I started my work as an AmeriCorps VISTA with Neighbor Works Alaska last November, focusing on food security in Anchorage. From the beginning of my project, I quickly learned that

Anchorage as well as greater Alaska as a whole needs locally grown food more than ever right now, with a local 12.7% food insecurity rate (37,940 people) and state rate of 14.7% (105,770 people). There was a lot of work to be done. I saw this issue to be larger than food insecurity, and more like food injustice. This could change if we invest in sustainable agriculture

large scale farms and become less reliant on food imports which is up to 98% of the food consumed. Back in the

1950s Alaska was providing 60% of

their own locally produced food, so why can't it be continued to this day? Although the issue of food security seems daunting and hard to resolve, there is still hope. Thankfully there are some great programs and initiatives like Yarducopia giving people access to land in order to grow food, and the local food movement known as Alaska Grown that pushes consumers to purchase food produced by local farmers. I also had the opportunity to impact the community in numerous ways, ranging from gardening with residents at the Adelaide and children at

Hampstead Heath to starting a local seed library at the Mountain View Neighborhood Library. I was also glad to work with other VISTAs and organizations working towards the same common goals to alleviate food insecurity and build resiliency. If there was one thing I would want people to take away from me being here is that food insecurity doesn't have a defined look or common meaning among people, but it contains many factors that may cause people not to have access to food. Once those factors are identified then there must be work towards a solution because food should be treated as a necessity not as a commodity in a state where 1 in 5 children are food insecure."
